National Library of Ireland Catholic Parish Registers site has free images of Catholic Parish Register microfilms for baptisms and marriages from the majority of Catholic parishes in Ireland and Northern Ireland up to 1880 (some to 1900)

- There are no image transcripts or indexes on this site
- There are help videos on how to search and use the search features. Many registers are in Latin and there are links to help. *FamilySearch* has a handy guide here tinyurl.com/pshhgeh
- Local family history centres hold indexes and transcripts for their local areas. See RootsIreland www.rootsireland.ie/ \$

Representative Church Body Library holds the archives and manuscripts of the Church of Ireland, including surviving parish registers and vestry minute books. Also on this site:

Regional Libraries

Regional libraries in Ireland offer access to local studies and family history collections with material not available elsewhere. Online resource lists are available for Carlow, Cavan, Donegal, Galway, Kerry, Laois, Offaly, Roscommon, Sligo and Westmeath libraries. Extensive online resources are available for Clare, Cork City, Dublin City, Kildare, Mayo, Tipperary and Waterford libraries.

Specialist Archives

www.delanyarchive.ie

The Delany Archive cares for four main archival collections:

- The Roman Catholic Diocese of Kildare & Leighlin collection includes papers of the Bishops of the Diocese, 1726-1967 including details of schools. The diocese covers most of Carlow and Kildare plus parts of Offaly, Laois, Kilkenny, Wexford and Wicklow
- Brigidine Sisters collection from c1807 relates to the Brigidine Sisters in Ireland, Britain, Australia, New Zealand, United States, Mexico and Papua New Guinea
- Patrician Brothers collection from c1808 includes archives for communities in Ireland, India, Australia, United States, Papua New Guinea and Kenya
- Carlow College - Founded in 1782, Carlow College educated priests for more than 200 years. The collection from 1783 details ecclesiastical students and staff, financial records, management and administration documentation plus more. This site has online documents and photos plus a link to a photo collection on Flickr (994 items). Use *Flickr Photo Search*, a photo search engine to find photos in the huge Flickr library. Major Genealogy Sites - Free

IrishGenealogy.ie offers access to:

- 3+ million pre 1900 church records and images for Dublin City (COI and RC); Kerry and Carlow (COI) plus the Diocese of Cork and Ross (RC)
- Civil Records include registration indexes for births over 100 years, marriages over 75 years and deaths over 50 years. Free register images online for births 1864-1916, marriages 1870-1941 and deaths 1878-1966. Births 1917-1918, Marriages 1942-1943 and deaths 1967-1968 due to be added early 2019. Images back to 1845 for non RC marriages and deaths back to 1864 to be added when available. Records for all of Ireland available to 1921 and from 1922 for the Republic of Ireland only IrishGenealogy.ie 'one stop search' includes searches across:
 - The 1901 census and 1911 census
 - Indexes to the civil registration of births deaths and marriages
 - Griffith's valuation 1847-1864
 - Tithe applotment books 1823-1837
 - National Archives of Ireland collection of soldiers' wills 1914-1918
 - Records of the Bureau of Military History 1913-1921
 - Online catalogue of the National Library of Ireland
 - Ireland-Australia transportation database 1791-1861

FamilySearch - worldwide historical record collections (2451+) includes 16 collections for Ireland:

- Births and baptisms 1620-1881; marriages 1619-1898 and deaths 1864-1870. These index original family, church and civil registration records held in repositories in Ireland. Handout – Irish Research on the Internet

- Civil registration collection includes: Indexes to birth, death and marriages 1864-1958 (Northern Ireland counties to 1922) and index to non-Catholic marriages 1845-1864
 - Civil registration 1845-1913 - Index to civil registration records - births 1864-1913, marriages 1845-1870 and deaths 1864-1870. This work in progress is a new useful index to the free original records images at IrishGenealogy.ie.
 - Calendar of wills and administrations 1858-1920 *
 - Census survivals 1821-1851; 1901-1911 census and census search forms 1841-1851 *
 - Petty Sessions Court Registers 1828-1912
 - Tithe applotment books 1814-1855 *
 - Valuation Office Books 1831-1856 are the original notebooks for the Griffith's Valuation *

About Will Calendars

- Up to Jan 1858 wills were proved by ecclesiastical (church) courts
- In 1858 civil probate commenced with wills proved by probate registries
- From 1858 annual alphabetical will calendars (indexes) were issued. These list name, residence, occupation, death date plus who probate was granted to, their address, occupation and estate value Searches and images (free) are available at
- National Archives of Ireland genealogy site - calendars of wills and administrations 1858-1922
- National Archives of Ireland site www.nationalarchives.ie - calendars 1923-1982. Use *Search the Archives* and enter a surname
- Public Record Office of Northern Ireland – will calendars indexes and images for the district probate registries of Armagh, Belfast and Londonderry. The index covers 1858-1965. Images of the copy will books 1858-1918 are online and these let you view the full content of a will

MATHESON Robert E Sir, *Varieties and synonymes of surnames and Christian names in Ireland for the guidance of registration officers and the public in searching the indexes of births, deaths, and marriages*, H.M. Stationery Office Dublin, 2nd edn, 1901. 94p. A must read book that uses examples, from Irish records, to show how Irish names evolved, were altered, and what variants and nicknames were used. If you are having trouble finding your Irish family this book could help.

Newspapers

British Newspaper Archive offers access to 30.5+ million newspaper pages 1700 to current. There are 164 titles covering all counties in Ireland. There is a free search but a subscription is needed to access the digitised images. Several reasonably priced packages are available \$.

TIP: This archive is available for free, onsite, at state, public and family history libraries. Check what might be available onsite at a library near you. This archive is also available through Findmypast \$.

Irish Newspaper Archives offers access to 80 national and regional newspaper titles covering 1738 to present. This archive is available for free using the eResources link at National Library and also available to residents of Victoria and Western Australia from their state library.

eResources

Major libraries subscribe to a wide variety of subscription databases and make them available online for free as eResources. Historical material includes: books, directories, journals, periodicals, parliamentary papers, newspapers and much more.
